In addition, this theory—that of the German sociologist Niklas Luhmann—is one of the most (if not the most) powerful contemporary general sociological theories (Luhmann, 1982, 1987, 1988). Therefore, in the rest of this section, rather than making an eclectic use of different social theories, I briefly present portions of Luhmann's theory.
